

Pursuant to Title 43, Texas Administrative Code (TAC), 15.3, revisions to metropolitan planning area boundaries must be approved by the governor or the governor's designee. In October of 2005 Governor Perry delegated authority to the Texas Transportation Commission to approve metropolitan area boundary changes.

On January 31, 2008, by minute order, the Texas Transportation Commission approved the proposed Lubbock MPO metropolitan area boundary change in accordance with Title 23, CFR 450.308.

The Lubbock Metropolitan Planning Organization's Transportation Policy Committee approved the expansion of the Metropolitan area Boundary at the October 16, 2007 meeting. Lubbock has been experiencing growth in the south and southwest portion of Lubbock County and the MPO expects this area to become urbanized within the next twenty years. Revisions include incorporating the south part of Lubbock as part of the metropolitan area with the new boundary being FM 41 to the south, CR 1140 to the east and US 87 to the west.
